Message from the Principal

Fourteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time, Cycle A

Sunday, July 5, 2020

Gospel Reading Matthew 11:25-30 Jesus prays in thanks to God, who has revealed himself to the lowly. Background on the Gospel Reading

Today's reading from Matthew's Gospel comes after a discourse in which Jesus reproaches people who have witnessed his mighty deeds yet still lack belief. In this context, today's Gospel explains the reason for this unbelief and reveals what is necessary for faith. Today's Gospel also continues to enhance our understanding of discipleship as last week's Gospel did.

Jesus' first prays in thanksgiving to God who has made himself known to Jesus' disciples. He praises God who has made himself known to the "little ones" and not to the wise and learned. As in other recent readings from Matthew's Gospel, a contrast is made here between the unbelieving Pharisees, who are wise and learned, and the faithful disciples, tax collectors, and sinners with whom Jesus keeps company.

The second part of this reading calls to our attention the unity between the Father and the Son. God has made himself known through Jesus, and in knowing Jesus, we come to know the Father. In Jesus' life and in his person, God reveals himself to us.

In the concluding sentences of today's Gospel, Jesus' teaching is again contrasted to the teaching of the Pharisees. This common theme of Matthew's Gospel probably reflects tension that existed between Jesus and the Pharisees and between the Pharisees and the community of Christians for whom Matthew wrote. Pharisaic Judaism became the predominant form of Judaism after the destruction of the Temple in Jerusalem about 70 A.D. Here that tension is expressed as alternative paths of holiness. The careful observance of the Mosaic law taught by the Pharisees could be experienced by some as difficult and burdensome. In contrast, Jesus' way of holiness is presented as uncomplicated and even restful.

Special Character Bless Feast

Blessed Anne-Marie Javouhey Feast Day Friday July 15th

Imagine a Mother Teresa in the France of Napoleon's day and you will have a picture of Anne-Marie Javouhey. Nanette, as she was called, was a "velvet brick," a thin layer of gentleness covering her determined core. A competent leader, Nanette dominated every scene in her adventurous life.

In 1800, she tested her vocation with the Sisters of Charity at Besançon. One night she heard a voice say, "You will



ith the Sisters of Charity at Besançon. One night she heard a voice say, "You will accomplish great things for me." A few nights later, St. Teresa of Ávila with black, brown, and bronze children appeared to her. "God wants you to found a congregation to care for these children," said the saint.

In 1801, Nanette and her three natural sisters opened a school for poor children near Chamblanc. In 1812 she founded the Sisters of St. Joseph of Cluny.

In 1817, Mother Javouhey sent sisters to the African island of Reunion to open her first missionary outpost. It wasn't long before she had sisters serving black, brown, and bronze people at remote places in Africa at Senegal, Sierra Leone, and Gambia, and in South America at French Guiana. With faith the sisters battled extreme hardship everywhere.

At the government's request, Mother Javouhey undertook some very unusual tasks. For example, she spent four years supervising the establishment of a colony for blacks at Mana, French Guiana. Then in 1834 she accepted the most remarkable assignment of her life. Six hundred slaves were to be liberated in Guiana, and she was asked to prepare them for emancipation by training them in the ways of religion and civilized society. As each family was ready to be freed,

Mother Javouhey arranged for them to have money, some land, and a cottage.

Anne-Marie Javouhey spent the last years of her life in France directing the work of her burgeoning congregation. When she died in 1851, her sisters were in thirty-two countries and colonies.

YOUR NEW BUS CARD IS COMING FROM 27TH JULY 2020

Tauranga Students

Bee Card, your new electronic smart card for using the bus is launching on the **27th July** when fare charging resumes.

The Bee Card makes boarding faster, and easier for you. Just tag on by holding your card to the

Bee Card reader as you board the bus, and tag off when you leave.



If you already have an existing bus card you will need to replace it with a registered Bee Card. For a limited time, getting a Bee Card is free.

The easiest way to get your new Bee Card is to go online at beecard.co.nz and have it posted to you free of charge (could take up to 10 working days).

Alternatively, pick up your Bee Card from a bus driver and register the card online at Beecard.co.nz, or pick up from a Bay of Plenty Regional Council office at:

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How does the Bee Card affect school students?

If school students travel on the blue dedicated Bayhopper school buses, they will get free travel and will not need to use a Bee Card. However, if a student uses the yellow Bayhopper buses in Tauranga at any time, including the school free travel period before 9am and between 2:30 and 6pm, they will need a Bee Card. If they don't have a Bee Card students will not get free travel during the school free travel period.

The Bee Card needs to be registered for a child concession (a cheaper fare) to apply outside the school free travel period. If the child concession is not applied to the Bee Card, the student will be charged an adult fare.

The easiest way to get the concession is to go to the Bee Card website beecard.co.nz or to go to a Regional Council Office.

Multiple Bee Cards on one account

With the Bee Card you can have multiple Bee Cards attached to one account. This means the whole family, even extended family can be associated to the one account. So before setting up an account, check if the family already has an account setup.

Balance transfers

Got unused credit on your old Smartride card? Starting from July 6th until the end of October 2020, you will be able to transfer your balance from your old Smartride to a registered Bee Card. Closer to the time, we will let you know the different transfer methods available.

In the meantime, get a Bee Card, make sure it is registered, then you will be all set to get a balance transfer done when they become available.
